Canadian AIDS Society

HIV Connect

We know that outcomes for people living with HIV improve when they are represented in leadership and program staffing.

The Canadian AIDS Society is holding community consultations across Canada to build an online training resource for organizations in clinical and community-based settings who intentionally want to incorporate more people living with HIV in their workforces. We hope that these organizations will include PCCC members and others in the palliative care sector.

Canadian Association for Spiritual Care

Spiritual Care Practitioners Advanced Certification in Palliative and Bereavement Care

In partnership with Atlantic School of Theology, CASC/ACSS. Three members from the Community of Practice for Palliative and Bereavement Care, have enrolled in the Graduate University Course, Pastoral Psychology: Dying, Death and Bereavement. As part of the pilot project to determine the requirements for an advanced certification in Palliative and Bereavement Care.

Spiritual Care Community of Practice

In partnership with Pallium Canada and its Palliative Care ECHO Project, the Spiritual Care Community, series 2. Continues to offer webinars facilitated by a team of four CASC/ACSS members. The response to these webinars has been positive and fosters interprofessional collaboration.

Chapter in a Book

Advance Care Planning Canada

Last Aid® Canada

Last Aid ® is an evidence-based, public education course about the fundamentals of Palliative Care, grounded in the compassionate communities movement.

It is currently offered in 20+ countries around the world. By 2020, over 27,500 individuals had participated and over 2000 instructors trained across Europe. We are pleased to announce that in Spring 2025, CHPCA will be offering this course in Canada.

The course consists of four modules: Death as a Normal Part of Life, Planning Ahead, Relieving Suffering, and Final Goodbyes. It will be offered primarily online to begin, with the goal of offering in-person and online courses in the future.

PACE for PSWs

PACE for PSWs (https://www.chpca.ca/education/pace-for-psws/) is an exciting, flexible 10-course online program, made possible through a collaboration between the CHPCA (https://www.chpca.ca/), Life and Death Matters (https://lifeanddeathmatters.ca/), and HPCO (https://www.hpco.ca/), created to provide much-requested support and education for Personal Support Workers. Content reviewed includes communication, integrating a palliative approach to care, supporting physical comfort, the importance of self-care, and providing culturally safe care.

Participants will become more comfortable and confident when providing palliative care for people with life-limiting illnesses and their families.

Palliative Approach in Long-Term Care Community of Practice

The <u>Palliative Approach in Long-Term Care Community of Practice (LTC CoP)</u> celebrated its fourth year in 2024. Canadian Partnership Against Cancer

Palliative Care Competencies

This initiative aims to enhance the adoption of the Canadian Interdisciplinary Palliative Care Competency Framework, expand access to educational resources and foster sustainable changes through mentoring and knowledge building among providers of home-based palliative care. Development of provider skills, knowledge and attitudes will be strengthened to ensure that Canadians affected by cancer and other life-limiting illnesses have a better quality of life.

Models of Care

The Models of Care funding initiative is a pan-Canadian effort that supports the design, implementation and evaluation of innovative models of care which aim to improve quality, efficiency and help to address inequities in cancer service delivery and access. This initiative also supports partner efforts to co-develop and validate proposed models of care through community engagement with equity-denied populations. The Partnership is currently supporting multiple projects focused on palliative care, with project implementation until 2027.

Equitable Palliative Care Closer to Home

The Equitable Palliative Care Closer to Home initiative supports the development and uptake of palliative and end-of-life care tools, resources and education for caregivers and health professionals providing palliative care in home and community care settings specific to the priorities and needs of First Nations, Inuit and Métis Peoples. These resources will be culturally specific and designed to promote culturally safe palliative care to enable connections to communities, culture and family.



Canadian Virtual Hospice

Advancing Grief Literacy in Canada

- The Canadian Grief Alliance (CGA), in collaboration with Canadian Virtual Hospice, was awarded \$1 million in funding by Health Canada to develop foundational resources and learning opportunities to help Canadians understand and respond to grief. Read the announcement here.
- The CGA will also deliver the First Steps Action Plan with recommendations to government in 2025.
- Launched with Minister Mark Holland in November 2023, the announcement resulted in more than 35 media stories and a reach of over 50 million.
- 35 consultations with over 200 grief experts and key organizations were held in every province.
- In December 2023, a public, online survey was launched to capture the experiences and needs of Canadians regarding loss and grief. Over 3800 individuals responded to the survey, resulting in a massive data set on grief, which will inform the work. In addition, over 500 individuals and organizations provided contact information to be further engaged in the project as it evolves.
- An Executive Summary of the survey results was publicly released, resulting in 20 media stories with a reach of over 10 million.
- The Children's Grief Symposium was held in November 2023 and 2024, led by the Canadian Alliance of Grieving Children.
- The "<u>Grief Chats</u>" monthly webinar series continues to run on the second Monday of every month, at 8:30 pm ET. Members of the public can share grief experiences and get answers to their questions about loss, hosted by Marney Thompson and Maxinne Rattner.
- In 2024, additional webinars were added, including "Conversations sur le deuil" offered in French, as well as a series aimed at professionals, and special topic webinars addressing different types of grief (e.g., pet loss, culture and grief, grief and the holidays). All the webinar recordings are available here.
- A Canadian Grief Network was established for people working in grief. Quarterly
 meetings focus on networking, education, and resource sharing. Sign up can be found
 here.
- A social media campaign is underway aimed at enhancing public understanding and response to grief, as well as sharing the lived experiences of people who are grieving, to spark conversations about grief and normalize the many varied ways it can look and feel.
- Two new infographics to support people's ability to understand and respond to grief were launched:
 - o Grief is...
 - Ideas for supporting someone who is grieving
- A national grief website will be launching in Spring 2025 providing information on all types of grief and loss. The website will include articles, a video library, resources, as well as a database of grief programs and services.

Innovation Challenge 2024

From an initial pool of 57 submissions from 14 countries, six finalists were chosen through a peer-review process to compete in a high-energy power hour of innovation hosted by Canadian Virtual Hospice and emceed by Dr. Cory Ingram of Mayo Clinic on Friday, October 18, 2024, between 12:30 - 2:00 pm at the International Palliative Care Congress in Montreal.

Finalists had six minutes to capture the attention of the voting audience and our panel of eminent palliative care judges in order to be named "International Palliative Care Innovator for 2024" and receive the \$1,000 CAN and a trophy from Canadian Virtual Hospice.

Sarah Scott and Terri Milton, from the Valley Hospice Foundation in Nova Scotia, were awarded the coveted title of International Palliative Care Innovator 2024, for their innovation, *Grief Library: Sending resources of healing to rural Nova Scotians*. Sarah and Terri purchased Playaway® audio books with the prize money, which require no device and no Internet connection to listen. They also purchased compatible earbuds, so those who borrow the Playaway books don't need to own a pair (and they get to keep them).

Interview series with Louise Penny

A video series with acclaimed author, Louise Peny, is planned for release in early 2025.
 In an October 2024 interview with Canadian Virtual Hospice, Louise Penny shares her experience caring for her late husband, Michael, who was diagnosed with dementia in his seventies.



 She reflects on the significant challenges they faced, related to lack of resources and support and the overwhelming responsibility of caregiving, learning to adapt by embracing patience and seeking help from friends and community. Penny found comfort in her writing and in honouring his love for life - her character Chief Inspector Gamache is partially inspired by Michael. She found that hope shifts over time, and her final hope was to ensure his dignity and comfort in his last days.

New Mother's Day/Father's Day KidsGrief Resource

- A new <u>KidsGrief resource</u> was developed and launched to help adults support children who are grieving the death of a parent in the time surrounding Mother's Day and Father's Day.
- The development was led by child life specialist Ceilidh Eaton Russell and the release promotions coincided with these dates.

Refresh of KidsGrief.ca

 <u>KidsGrief.ca</u> is being refreshed with updated content and a shift from a module-based format to a more easy-to-digest, concise format for parents and adults supporting children who are living with grief. Content update is in its final stages, and web redesign is beginning.



My Life, My Grief - Workbook to support children

Indigenous Voices 3: Supporting Healthy Ways of Living Through Grief and Loss

- Canadian Virtual Hospice (CVH) is partnering with Indigenous Peoples on an initiative to enhance support for Indigenous Peoples experiencing grief. A team led by Holly Prince, Anishinaabekwe from Opwaaganisiniing, alongside Elders and Knowledge Carriers from across Canada, will work to address critical gaps in available support by developing Indigenous-led, trauma-informed grief resources and education, including a new webinar series. The project aims to:
 - Amplify Indigenous voices: Ensure Indigenous Peoples' voices, experiences, and knowledge are central to all grief resources and education developed.
 - Address historical and systemic gaps: Create culturally safer, Indigenous-led resources that address the impacts of colonization, intergenerational trauma, and systemic inequities.
 - Promote healing: Support wholistic healing for Indigenous Peoples through education and culturally grounded grief practices. oEnhance cultural safety in healthcare: Provide tools to health and social care providers to deliver culturally safe and trauma-informed grief care.
- The project will run from 2025-27 and the first session of the webinar series will be February 5, 2025.

Canadian Healing Quilt

- Inspired by the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic, and the vision of Elder Albert McLeod, the Virtual Healing Quilt is an online platform to help families come together virtually to grieve, to memorialize and honour their loved-one(s) and begin to heal together.
- Families can create a digital quilt panel that depicts the life story or other special remembrances of their loved one.
- The completed panel will become part of a virtual mosaic of quilt squares from across Canada that visitors can scroll through to honour those who have died.
- Funded by the Winnipeg Foundation, the Virtual Healing Quilt will launch in spring 2025.

Veterans Transition, Loss, and Grief Project

- Canadian Virtual Hospice has been engaged by Veterans Affairs Canada to develop a
 suite of online resources to provide psychosocial support tailored to the specific needs of
 grieving Veterans and their families, including traumatic loss, managing intense
 emotions, multiple losses, ambiguous loss, managing difficult situations, managing
 family dynamics, maladaptive coping strategies, and the grief and loss of identity
 associated with transitioning back to civilian life.
- Extensive engagement with Veterans, families and organizations has driven the development of a set of online modules, which includes over 600 video clips of the lived experience of Veterans and their families.
- Funded by Veterans Affairs Canada, the modules will launch in the spring of 2025.

Online Peer Grief Support Group for Veterans

- As one component of a larger project funded by Veterans Affairs, Canadian Virtual Hospice piloted an online peer grief support group for Veterans of the Canadian Armed Forces and Royal Canadian Mounted Police in the fall of 2024.
- Co-facilitated by a grief expert and military Veteran, this group provided weekly peer support to 8 Veterans of the CAF and RCMP from across Canada.
- The pilot group was considered a success, with participants and facilitators describing the creation of a psychologically safe environment that encouraged sharing among members.
- A robust evaluation was completed, which identified the strengths and value of the online peer facilitation model and identified opportunities for refinement for future groups.

Saluting Service - Honouring the Contributions and Service of Veterans

- Leveraging the Canadian Healing Quilt, *Saluting Service* is a platform where families can honour the service of Canadian Armed Forces and Royal Canadian Mounted Police Veterans.
- The online platform will allow families to come together to create a digital quilt panel to honour the service of a Veteran (living or deceased).
- The completed panel will become part of a virtual mosaic of quilt squares from across Canada, acknowledging and honouring the service and contributions of CAF and RCMP Veterans.
- Funded by Veterans Affairs Canada, Saluting Service will launch in 2025.



Canadian Society of Respiratory Therapists

The Canadian Society of Respiratory Therapists continues to look for opportunities to provide education on palliative care to its members. We recently hosted a webinar on palliative care competencies for respiratory therapists developed by Covenant Health, and hosted speakers on palliative care at our annual conference. We also promote external palliative care education opportunities and supports provided through PCCC member organizations. The CSRT also included a recommendation relative to palliative care in its Choosing Wisely Recommendations for Respiratory Therapy.

National Initiative for the Care of the Elderly

National Initiative for the Care of the Elderly (NICE)

The National Initiative for the Care of the Elderly (NICE - https://www.nicenet.ca/) is a network of researchers, practitioners, students, and seniors dedicated to improving the care of older adults. NICE Information Tools generated by NICE research are augmented by reports from national research entities, e.g., the Canadian Institutes of Health Research (CIHR) and/or the National Institutes of Health (NIH) in the United States.

End-of-Life Issues Theme Team Activities

Activities of the End-of-Life Issues Theme Team (EOLITT) focus on the further distribution of the network's evidence-based Information Tools, including Capacity and Consent and When Someone Close to You is Dying. These are available for free download here (https://www.nicenet.ca/nice-tools).

Digital End-of-Life Planning Tool

A digital End-of-Life Planning Tool, including making decisions about medical care, financial matters, funeral arrangements, and the distribution of assets, is now available on the network's website at https://www.nicenet.ca/articles/end-of-life-planning. Pre-planning spares family and friends from the emotional strain of figuring out what someone close would have wanted.

Building palliative care capacity through education

There is growing recognition across the Canadian health care system that introducing palliative care earlier, alongside treatments for life-limiting illnesses, significantly improves quality of life for patients and families.



To address this need, Pallium launched <u>LEAP Renal (online)</u>, tailored for health care professionals in renal care, and introduced our first non-LEAP course, the <u>Canadian Serious Illness Conversations (CSIC)</u> course. This online or hybrid course equips health care professionals with the tools and knowledge needed to have compassionate and effective conversations with patients and their families dealing with serious illnesses.

Looking ahead to 2025, we are excited to roll out new and updated LEAP courses, as well as specialized offerings, including our Psychosocial Spiritual Care Modules and Indigenous Palliative Care Modules, to further support health care professionals in delivering holistic, culturally sensitive care.

Five years of continuous learning with the Palliative Care ECHO Project

Pallium Canada continued to spread and scale the Palliative Care ECHO Project. Together with our partners, we have built a unique, national platform that fosters continuous professional development and empowers health care professionals with practical knowledge that they can use to improve palliative care for patients.

Over the past year, we have continued creating high-quality programs and communities of practice, including the <u>Lung Health Community of Practice</u>, in collaboration with the Lung Health Foundation, and the <u>French Paediatric Palliative Care Community of Practice</u>, in collaboration with Le Phare, Enfants et Familles.

We are looking forward to continuing to work with our Hub Partners over the next year: BC Centre for Palliative Care, Canadian Association for Long-Term Care, Canadian Gerontological Nursing Association, Canadian Home Care Association, Canadian Indigenous Nurses Association, Canadian Society of Palliative Medicine, Covenant Health, l'Institut de soins palliatifs et de fin de vie Maison Michel-Sarrazin - Université Laval, Médecins Francophones du Canada, Montreal Institute for Palliative Care, North Simcoe Muskoka Hospice Palliative Care Network, North West Regional Palliative Care Program, and Nova Scotia Health.

Canadian Palliative Care Atlas

Over the past year, the Dr. Joshua Shadd-Pallium Canada Research Hub has made major advancements in understanding the status of palliative care service availability in Canada with our ongoing work to develop the Canadian Palliative Care Atlas, the first of its kind in Canada.

We look forward to sharing the first three provincial editions of the Canadian Palliative Care Atlas, including Ontario, British Columbia, and Alberta, with you in 2025.

The World's Largest Palliative Care ECHO Session

On October 18, 2024, the Palliative Care ECHO Project, led by Pallium Canada and its partners, hosted the World's Largest Palliative Care ECHO Session, simultaneously online and in-person at the McGill International Palliative Care Congress in Montreal, Quebec.



We brought thousands of health care professionals together from 94 countries around the world and offered live interpretation in multiple languages. Participants learned from internationally acclaimed experts, shared experiences and best practices, and contributed to raising awareness and advancing accessible palliative care globally.

Pan-Canadian Palliative Care Research Collaborative

Seed Fund Competition

The PCPCRC Seed Funding Competition (https://pcpcrc.ca/seed-funding/) is designed to support early-career investigators and trainees facing a highly competitive and challenging funding environment. To support equitable palliative care research, it prioritizes funding for high-priority populations that typically experience poorer outcomes, where gaps in palliative care research and service delivery exist. In March 2024, we announced the two awardees for the 2024 PCPCRC Seed Fund Competition. Applications for the 2025 Seed Fund Competition were open from December 2, 2024, to January 24, 2025, with the awardees set to be announced in March 2025.

Training on Running a Palliative Care Study 101

With support from the Health Canada Health Care Policy and Strategies Program, we will host on March 25-27th, 2025, our inaugural training session titled "Running a Palliative Care Study 101." This training is specifically designed for research staff and early-career investigators but is open to anyone with a research interest, including clinicians, patients, caregivers, trainees, and policymakers.
